Nieverbale kommunikasie (p. 11 - 13)

Nieverbale kommunikasie is eenvoudig kommunikasie sonder die gebruik van woorde (gesproke of geskrewe). Op p. 12 en 13 van die studiegids word sekere aspekte van nieverbale kommunikasie gelys. Nieverbale kommunikasie is ook deel van konteks. Kyk na die tweede voorbeeld in Hulpbron 1. Wanneer Hannes sy arms oor sy bors vou is dit nieverbale kommunikasie en omdat ons agtergrondinligting oor die situasie het, kan ons die nieverbale kommunikasie korrek interpreteer.

Nieverbale kommunikasie kan ook gebruik word om byvoorbeeld woorde te beklemtoon en selfs sekere woorde te vervang.

Dit is baie belangrik om te onthou dat nieverbale kommunikasie kultuurspesifiek is. Dit beteken dat sekere nieverbale tekens nie dieselfde betekenis in elke kultuur het nie.

Nonverbal communication (p. 11 - 13)

Nonverbal communication is simply communication without the use of words (spoken or written). On p. 12 and 13 of the study guide, certain aspects of nonverbal communication are listed. Nonverbal communication is also a part of “konteks” (context). Read the second example in Resource 1 again. When Hannes crosses his arms over his chest he is using nonverbal communication to communicate. Since we have background information on that particular situation, we can therefore interpret the nonverbal communication correctly.

Nonverbal communication can also be used to emphasise words and even to replace certain words in a conversation.

It is very important to remember that nonverbal communication is culture specific. This means that certain nonverbal signs mean different things in different cultures.
