### Purpose of the module

We want to emphasise the importance of this module. You can open any newspaper and you will find more than one article on someone suffering some kind of loss, whether it is damage to property or personal injuries. No-one can escape being affected by the law of damages, and after completing this module, you should have a thorough understanding of what it entails.

As a practising lawyer, you will be responsible for advising your clients on whether they will be able to prove their claims in a court of law. It costs money to go to court and the quantification of a claim forms part of the decision on the viability of litigation. In this module we will show you how to quantify a civil claim. After completion of this module, you will be able to confidently advise your clients, firstly, on whether it is viable to litigate at all, and secondly, more or less what amount of damages they can expect to be awarded for the infringement of their rights.

## What will be expected of you?

You will have to spend at least eight hours a week on this module, preferably an hour a day during

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the week and three hours over the weekend. Some of the practical tasks will include group work, so a commitment to participate actively in the module will be essential to your success.

The final assessment of this module will be in the form of a portfolio, which may be submitted before the examination period commences. You can therefore complete this module before you start to write exams in your other modules. We will later explain in more detail how to submit this final assessment.

In this module we will expect you to do a lot of reading, but we have also included many practical scenarios and interesting activities to break the monotony of reading only text. The prescribed textbook for this module is *Visser & Potgieter's Law of Damages* 3 ed (Juta 2012).



In each learning unit we will indicate which paragraphs must be studied, by using this symbol:



and which paragraphs need only be read by using this symbol:



Whenever paragraph(s) are to be read only, we have summarised the essence of those paragraphs for you. The summary forms part of your study material. In your textbook, the essence of important case law has been included, but if we expect more detail from you, we will inform you. A few journal articles have also been included in your study material. If we refer in the text to paragraphs (par) and footnotes (fn), it means the paragraphs and footnotes in the textbook, and if we mention sections (sect), it refers to the sections in the Learning Units on myUnisa.

# Learning outcomes of the module

After completion of this module, you must be able to


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- 1. identify who has a claim and who must pay
- 2. state the source of the claim
- 3. indicate the different losses that have been suffered
- 4. explain the quantification process for each loss
- 5. explain the procedural process to be followed in claiming compensation

These 5 steps should be followed in practice every time you are faced by a new factual scenario and you have to advise a client on their legal position. In this module two factual scenarios will be presented to you - one on a motor vehicle accident and another on breach of contract. We call these factual scenarios "story boards" for academic purposes and you will find both these story boards visually portrayed in Learning Units 6 and 7. The final Portfolio to be submitted in this module is based on the Accident Story board and in assignments 2, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 14 you will answer questions relating to the first four steps as explained above. Questions on step 5 will form part of the final submission of the Portfolio. More detail will be provided later.

## **OVERVIEW OF THE ONLINE TOOLS**

You will find the online tools on the left hand drop down menu. For this module, we are going to be using the following tools on myUnisa to guide you in your studies:

# Home page / Welcome

This is your first introduction to the module and your lecturer.

## **Learning Units**

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This is the first place to go, when studying this online module. The Learning Units tool acts like a study guide that you may have used in other modules. This is where the lecturer will provide guidance on your learning programme, what to study or read from the textbook, when and how you should do activities and assignments, etc. Thus, this is where we will provide you with ongoing support for your teaching and learning in this module.

# **Assignments**

Your lecturers and the appointed markers will mark your assignments electronically. You are thus required to submit your written assignments online in pdf format via myUnisa. Software to convert Word documents to pdf is available on myUnisa. You

can also download a free pdf convertor from http://www.primopdf.com/index.aspx . This link will take you to PrimoPDF and you can download the free version, which is good enough for the purposes of the submission of your assignments.

To submit an assignment via myUnisa:

- Go to myUnisa.
- · Log in with your student number and password.
- Select the module: LPL4802
- Click on Assignments in the menu on the left-hand side of the screen.
- Click on the assignment number you wish to submit.
- · Follow the instructions to upload your assignment into the system.

After you upload your assignment, you will immediately receive an onscreen message with a reference number, like a receipt. Keep track of this number, in case you have a question about a specific assignment. Also your pdf document is protected and no one can change your answers. You will receive the marker's feedback on top of the pdf file so that you can read everything and understand your mistakes, if any.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THE SYSTEM WILL NOT ALLOW YOU TO RE-SUBMIT A WRITTEN ASSIGNMENT FOR AN ONLINE MODULE, SUCH AS THIS MODULE. This restriction is necessary because the lecturer has immediate access to the assignment and could have downloaded or marked it by the time you wish to replace it with another. Therefore be very careful when you submit assignments and ensure that it is the correct assignment or version of your assignment that will be submitted.

#### **Announcements**

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Announcements are one of the main communication tools in myUnisa.
